11.00am-1.00pm	<p>Outline of Case and Subtitle</p> <p>This module exposes participants start to expand the case into micro-level of the case study. Participants need to focus on the trigger action of the case. Participants should complete writing the case sub-title before the end of the session.</p>

2.00pm-3.30pm	<p>Closing Paragraph</p> <p>Participants need to construct the closing paragraph of the case to enable critical thinking for the case reader.</p>
